In a newsletter I received from our Doctor's Surgery this week, I read the following advice, "You may or may not follow media reports into the NHS – I try not to, having heard some words of wisdom in years gone by, that the easiest way to improve your happiness is to stop reading newspapers."

I understand this only too well but the



sad thing is that, although the Bible has the opposite effect, we do not read it as we should and we are more likely to believe what we read

in the daily paper than what we read in the Bible.

As a church, we want to not only read the Bible but to live it. The Gospel of Jesus Christ is good news! It is transforming and life-giving. As we focus our discussion around Vision 20:21, taken from the verse in John 20:21, we read Jesus' post-resurrection words to

I was born into a Caribbean family. My sister and I were made to go to church every which Sunday, was а Baptist however church, my parents and brothers did not attend. the At

time I didn't understand what going to church meant, I just went because I was told to go.

I stopped going to church in my teens when everything was good, I was partying hard, and giving my family a lot of trouble. I met my ex-husband late into my teens and we lived together. My mum didn't agree with this as she said it's not good to "live in sin" and we got married.

I don't actually know the time when I started to drink alcohol, but I drank for comfort. I had my daughter two years after my marriage; she was born asleep. My drinking got worse, I think it was grieving, but I drank to hide the pain. My marriage ended in a divorce and I carried on drinking. My daughter's father said he would take her away from me, but I didn't care, I just carried on drinking, and spiralled out of control.



L remember waking up in hospital and asking what day it was, as I had to get my daughter to school. The nurse said it was Tuesday, I diswas charged from hospital. Μv ex-husband

said I couldn't see my daughter without supervision from him, it was horrible; my daughter didn't want to see me, she put the phone down when I called, I went to see her at school, she didn't want to see me. I accepted that I had lost her and I would have to learn to live without her.

I had passed a Baptist church many times where I lived in Harrow and I said to myself I need to go there. I went on the Sunday and felt at home. I attended the Alpha Course, I began to

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accept lesus as my saviour. I prayed to God that I could have a closer relationship with Him.

I saw my daughter and tried to get our



back on track but she didn't trust me; my family said never give up hope, pray. Which I did. She came home when she was 16. We have the best relationship

now. I carried

on attending church, I attended baptism but I felt I was not ready.

I was ready to move home, I tried several Baptist churches in the area, but it

didn't feel right. I got a job and looked through the window and saw this church. I came in July 2014. I attended church the weekend and I spoke to a felchurch low member about baptism, how-



ever I didn't feel that I'm perfect enough to be baptised. She said, you will never be perfect and that's when I knew I wanted to give myself to the Lord and Saviour. He has taken me out of the depths of darkness, assisted me to keep my job and just love him so much

I realise that this is the beginning of my journey, and I feel like Jesus Christ is watching over me, protecting me, moulding me and shaping me into a better follower of Christ. This decision has made me a better person in Christ and to understand more about the Bible and to teach the Gospel to those who don't know who Christ is

Philippians 4v6-8: Tell God what you need, and thank him for all he has done, then you will experience God's peace which exceeds anything we can understand, his peace will guard your hearts and minds as you live in Christ Jesus.

I have not drunk since 2007as I will not make it rule me. Only God can rule.

My daughter has written this letter to me for today:

Dear Mum.

Congratulations on this next step in vour life!

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It takes work, perseverance, faith and a whole lot of other things to be able to pluck up the courage to take this plunge – yes, literally!

Although I can't be with you today, do not doubt that I am supporting you 110%. We may not agree on faith and religion, but we strongly believe in the love we have for each other and that is bigger than anything.

The last couple of years haven't always been the easiest for you, but I never doubt that you can pull through anything, including the most recent hurdle that had threatened everything you've ever worked for.

You inspire me always to be a better and stronger woman who thinks about everyone else, and then, herself.

So let today be yours and about this new chapter and achievement in your life. We could all do with more spirituality and I am endlessly proud of you for taking this step. I am with you today, even if not physically.

I am with you, God is with you. I love you endlessly and eternally.

<u>Baptism</u> <u>Devon Spencer – 6th December 2015</u>



"For him who has conquered the mind, the mind is the best of friends; But for one who has failed to do so, his mind will remain the greatest enemy" – *Bhagavad Gita*

For many years my mind was my greatest enemy, but I am learning to be the master of my own mind. I have a choice in the way I respond to how I feel.

Today is the first day of the rest of my life, today is my rebirth, the day I am washed clean, from all the misery, pain, torment, from all the shame and guilt, from all the disappointments, and move at last from



the darkness of the past into the light of life, my present and future. My whole life, everything that I had to endure, all that I have put my family through, the darkness that engulfed me has led to this moment in my life. When all hope had gone, that cleansing water awaits me now.

Let me tell you a story, take you on a journey into my life, and how life can sometimes deal a horrible blow, sometimes in life things happened beyond your control and left you scarred. Selfharming was my cure for the demons in my head, gambling became a way of life to escape from reality. I was in a quicksand, sinking, with no way out. Severe depression they called it then.

Flashbacks and memories haunted my dreams, I was sinking and drowning in confusion and helplessness. Medication, section again, PTSD, but I could not face it. I was not ready to tell the world how my innocence was stolen, fear of rejection and blame, with all the shame and self-loathing.

And for the last 45 years that has been my life - lost, voiceless and too damaged to be fixed. I was stuck in the past, trying to cope with it all. This time a year ago in my head I was ready to go, and yet something called me to RBC. Today I stand here and tell you that I still take medication, am in therapy dealing with the past, but my new

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family here, Richard Knight and his family who embraced me and offered

me a place at his table, Carol, Angie, Sandra and Clarie, and Karen and her amazing testimony, they are just a few of many, and they have been my greatest therapy. I am healing now and breaking free.



My family is here

today, as they have always been, supporting me through some difficult times, even when I push them away, even when they could not comprehend what was going on with me, they never gave up on me, their patience and love, and their giving is beyond measure. My cousin Alistair and his wife who took me in when I was at my most vulnerable, weak, lost and frightened, and there were times when I tested him. but he never gave up on me. Patricia, a lady of substance, who came to me when I was at a dark, dark place, is here today to witness my testimony, my truest friend.

Today is for them and all who have given me so much and ask for nothing, but most of all today is for my God and His power to heal and transform a lost wretched soul like mine. For me, being a Christian is being a new Christian every day, with passion and excitement, with an insatiable thirst and hunger aching to be filled.

My journey has just begun, a new day is dawning and whatever plans my God has for me, I will follow Him without question, and thus I put my faith, my life and all my trust in Him.

I cannot change what happened to me, or the mistakes I have made, but I can change the way I respond to it.

Joshua 1 v 9: Be strong and courageous. Do not be terrified, do not be discouraged, for the Lord your God will be with you wherever you go.

And thus I leave you with this poem:

I am free

I was lost and wandering aimlessly; On a long dark melancholy road But you found me, and guided me I was alone and scared in the dark, No one heard my cries, No one saw blackness But You shine a bright light on me.
