Obituary - In His Presence with Thanksgiving Beryl Wells

15th November 1937 to 16th January 2017

I am sad to report the death of one of our members, Beryl Wells who went to be with her Lord on 16th January 2017. Beryl was born and grew up in Barking and trusted Jesus and then followed the Lord throughout her life.

A significant situation early in her life overshadowed her life when her best friend was bombed in the war on her way out of St Margaret's church, Barking. This traumatic loss shaped Beryl and how she related to people in later life.

Her spiritual walk following her trust in Jesus involved serving in the church in several ways. She and her husband, Paul, hosted a Small Group in their home at RBC, Paul was a deacon and Beryl was a Sunday School teacher, and she regularly helped with washing the communion cups.

Beryl's working life comprised a number of secretarial-based roles, starting with a stockbrokers in the West End of London, followed by Ford, and Hawk Tiling company in Gidea Park. Beryl later became an NHS Medical Secretary and a Legal Secretary.

Beryl had many interests and in her

younger days was a county level sprinter and Javelin thrower, and she was also a very good singer. She maintained a deep interest in all TV sports and followed various sports from darts to motor racing, Wimbledon and snooker. Beryl was also a keen supporter of the Queen and the Monarchy.

Beryl's husband, Paul, was a Post Office Engineer/BT Engineer and later Facilities Manager at YMCA, but sadly died at the young age of sixty in 1997. From this time onwards Beryl was totally devoted to her family and took a great interest in the progress of her grandchildren and in the Pyrenean mountain dogs which her son Andrew bred. Beryl also visited Andrew and Yuping while they were living in Singapore for a while, but wasn't keen on flying

She retained a lifelong interest in money matters, finance and economics and kept in touch with many people from her past workplaces.

Beryl will be greatly missed by her family and friends, but she is now reunited with her beloved husband Paul in heaven.

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Obituary - In His Presence with Thanksgiving

30th December 1927 to 21st January 2017



I am sad to report the death of one of our members, Ida Hotten, who went to be with her Lord on 21st January 2017.

Ida lived her entire life within five miles of Romford and did not leave England until she was in her mid forties.

She was a traditional wife and mother and devoted herself to her husband and children and was quiet, undemonstrative, loyal and determined.

Ida supported her children and grandchildren through many of life's challenging situations and was unfailing in her love, time and attention.

Ida found faith in her later years and was baptized at RBC on 24th February 1980 by Rev. Norman Wright. Her baptismal certificate quoted the text "The Lord is near, have no anxiety but in everything make your requests known to God in prayer", and she sought to live by those words.

Ida worked in Heathside Care Home for a number of years and demon-

strated her caring and loving attitude to life in this environment too.

In mid-life her horizons opened as she travelled with members of the church to the Holy Land and then to Norway and Austria. She was sustained during difficult times by friendships built through the church.

Ida also travelled extensively with her the children and grandchildren, visiting countries such as Portugal, Cyprus, Italy and Tunisia, but these travels were often eventful with delays and troubles. She bore these difficulties with fortitude and this characteristic remained with her when ill health and infirmity blighted her later life.

Ida spent her last few years as a resident of Parkside and was well cared for as her health declined.

Ida will be missed by family and friends but is now with her Lord and Saviour in heaven.

From as far back as I can remember (my whole life actually) I have been raised in the

Obituary - In His Presence with Thanksgiving Rose Alexandra Chaplin



1st December 1925 to 26th January 2017

I am sad to report the death of one of our members, Rose Chaplin, who went to be with her Lord on 26th January 2017.

Rose was born in the East End of London on 1st December 1925, daughter to Harry and Rose Philpot, and grew up with two brothers, Ted and Den. Her childhood years in the East End were hard due to overcrowding and family poverty, but they were fun times nonetheless. However, she left school at the age of fourteen due to the start of World War 2 to work full time in Cavaliers, a Tailors making uniforms for the servicemen.

When the bombing started in London, Mum's family moved to Collier Row and Rose started work on aircraft instrumentation for the war effort, this is where she met the Chaplin sisters who invited her to a family party. Here she met Len, on leave from the Air Force and they married in Collier Row on 29th July 1950.

Rose was a wonderful wife to Len and a marvellous Mum to Valerie and Stephen, and she was someone who always had time for and cared about others, would always see the best in people, and was rational and always positive.

Len was a panel beater, repairing cars at Gates of Woodford, while Rose assembled fastening straps at home for the Lovable Bra factory on Harold Hill, and later secured a job as Returns Manager with the same company.

Rose was always on the move, rushing here and there to make ends meet, and was a great cook who always ensured that there was a cooked meal on the table each evening. Desserts were Rose's favourite, long with "After eight" mints.

However, tough times began when Len suffered a stroke in his forties and Rose became a driving force in his rehabilitation. Rose also had several major operations but together they came through and were both soon back working full time.

Through all these experiences they encouraged their children to work hard and participate in a variety of activities, including Brownies & Cubs,



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swimming, fishing, cooking, sewing and walking with family in the local forests.

Rose was baptised at Romford Baptist Church in the late 1970s, after which she worked as a volunteer serving tea and biscuits to the residents of Heathside and Parkside Residential homes. Len later joined her in this area of service.

They continued to enjoy their holidays, visiting Italy on twelve occasions, and especially enjoyed Venice

Their daughter Val lived in Holland with her family and Rose even learned Dutch so that she could talk to her grandchildren.

Len sadly died on 18th May 1986 from cancer, and Rose though devastated, remained strong and became employed at Heathside. Rose remained a busy person but always had time to listen to, or help friends and neighbours and was devoted to her children and grandchildren. She often visited Holland as well as going to Israel with the Church, and took up driving again after 20 odd years.

In her mid-seventies, Rose developed early signs of Dementia and typically fought that too and continued to travel to Holland despite the signs of its onset worrying her.

Rose moved into Parkside in March 2005, no longer able to live at home and was made very welcome, surrounded by friends and old colleagues. She maintained a sense of humour throughout and when asked if she was alright would always reply "yes, all down one side". She enjoyed, and was always winning, the general knowledge quizzes there in the early days and was known for her singing and knew all the words to the Wartime songs.

Dementia and Parkinson's took their toll but Rose could not have been in a better place and the family are extremely grateful to all the staff and management of Parkside Residential Home, for the caring loving way they looked after her for the almost 12 years she has been there

Rose will be missed greatly by her family and friends, but she has moved on to a better place and is reunited with her beloved Len, and together again they will enjoy eternal happiness with their Lord.

Obituary - In His Presence with Thanksgiving Caroline Maud Speight

7th February 1951 to 1st February 2017

I am sad to report the death of one of our members, Carol Speight, who went to be with her Lord on 1st February 2017.

Carol's story is one of Christian faith and perseverance triumphing over adversity, since Carol grew up with learning difficulties, and by the time she had a family comprising two children, Peter and Laura, she was diagnosed with Schizophrenia. She was increasingly unable to care for herself and the children were looked after by their father.

Carol loved her family dearly – her children and her two grandsons, and she was very proud of them all, even though the physical distance between them meant that she did not see them much.

Carol had a flat in a notorious part of Harold Hill for several years and this did not help her health. Her mental health issues meant that she became a regular patient at Warley Psychiatric Hospital, and the prescribed medication reduced her ability to care for herself. Despite being well supported by church members, she was in a very dark place for many years. Around 2003 Carol met Michael Grey when he started to come along to the Sunday services at Harold Hill Baptist Church, and they both gave their lives to the Lord and were baptised. A platonic companionship developed between them, but Michael's physical health declined due to a lung disease and he became increasingly housebound. They helped each other as Carol would get shopping for him and he would encourage her to look after herself.

Around this time a flat became available for Carol near Collier Row, and this positive new development helped her to take more interest in her life and in other people. She was given the help of a carer, who helped Carol in many practical ways and went the extra mile in helping her. Carol would almost daily walk the mile to the nearest bus and come over to spend the day with Michael.

Carol came to RBC with Michael when Harold Hill Baptist Church closed, and the Lord began a restoration in her life that was marked by her increased wellbeing spiritually, mentally and physically. She was helped in this proc-



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ess by the dedication of a group of friends at RBC. She no longer had inpatient visits to Warley and reduced visits from the psychiatric nurse. Carol was able to take more care of herself personally and slowly reduced her smoking.

Sadly, in 2013 Michael Grey died, but Carol still blossomed in every way; however a decline in physical health made life more difficult for her. Her carer, Clare, and others helped Carol to move to Painsbrook Court last spring into a beautiful first floor flat overlooking the landscaped gardens. Carol was very happy there and with continued support from Clare and the staff she was never alone and yet had her independence.

We will truly miss Carol and her example of simple childlike trust and faith in Christ Jesus overcoming adversity. She always looked to help others and was never heard to complain, had a ready smile and positive attitude.

Carol is now at peace with her Heavenly Father and we give thanks for her life.

These are Susan's words:- I am 54 years old and I have lived in the Upminster and Romford area all of my life.

My Dad, Rodney, and my mum, Barbara, brought me up along with my sister, Marion and my brother, John. John is now married to Lynda, they both have children and I am thrilled to be an aunt to Asha, Leo and Luca.

We grew up in Upminster, where I attended church and Girls Brigade regularly. Sadly, when I was 10 my mum and dad separated, my brother and sister stayed with my dad but I chose to be with my mum. Unfortunately very quickly it became apparent that my mum could not look after me, so when I was 11 I was placed into a children's home.

I spent time in two children's home, my memories of these times are very happy ones and I liked being in the homes. I looked on my carers as Aunties and Uncles and I have kept in touch all this time with my social worker called Catrina, she and her husband Ian always send me a Christmas card.

After leaving the children's home I went and lived in a hostel, and I began work as a domestic in a care home called Grange Farm. I worked there for 18 years.

I have been coming to RBC for five years now and attended the Special Needs Alpha Course. I also attend the special needs group on a Friday morning where we are taught about the bible and a Christian life.

I also enjoy going to Causeway Prospects at St Peter's and have done so



for many years.

I have a partner, Peter, and we have been together for 13 years and we are engaged. I have many friends, a very close one being Tim, who couldn't be here today unfortunately as he has to work.

I enjoy coming to RBC because both myself and Peter are made to feel so welcome, people have been very kind and supportive to us.

Recently when a man called Ron who had been like a father to me passed away, I was supported by Liz Harvey. She kindly took me to his funeral, it was a very generous act of kindness by her to make sure I didn't miss it and I remember it to this day. And I thank her for that.

Also Lin Cuthbert, Liz and Mary Ashman have helped me with numerous things from clearing out my flat to taking me to doctors' appointments, all these kind things make coming to RBC very special for me.

There are a few reasons that I wish to be baptised this morning, one being that it tells you to in the Bible, another being that Jesus makes me feel better about myself and one other thing is that I was inspired too by Sally's recent baptism.

When things get difficult or tough I know I can pray to Jesus and he will be with me ...

<u>Baptism</u> <u>Samuel Sosina – 2nd February 2017</u>

My name is Samuel Sosina. I spent a good part of my life ignoring and running away from God.

Growing up as a teenager I'd attend church, go to Sunday school, learn and

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memorise the Lord's Prayer, attend youth alpha courses and I'd spend most of Friday nights at a Christian youth group hearing the word of God. As I grew older I'd eventually leave this and follow what was supposedly cool and turn away from God.

I would stop going to church altogether and find more gratification in alcohol, drugs, lust, materialism, gambling and many other things that would corrupt my mind and affect my behaviour. During this time I became very aggressive. I was filled with a lot of anger, jealousy, hate and had the worst temper that would often lead to fighting, bad mouthing and being very destructive and disruptive towards my class peers, friends and my own family.

Food Bank

We have been running our Food Bank outlet at Romford Baptist Church for almost 2 years, as part of the Collier Row Food bank network in coordination with The Trussel Trust. There are 3 food distribution centres in this network: ourselves on a Monday, St. Edwards in the Marketplace on a Wednesday and Church of the Ascension on a Friday. St Michael's church also helps with storage and managing the food stuffs. RBC now honour at least 4 food parcels a week, many of our clients being single young men. People get given a Food Bank voucher and come to us to get the food. Obviously is it mostly tinned stuff but we are now trying to include toiletries and other necessities. Most of our food comes through Tesco but an increasing amount comes from our church and even strangers who hear about our food bank and want to donate. This is a big operation which was up until re-

cently coordinated by Jan Stainer from The Church of the Good Shepherd. She was responsible for approaching churches and organisations to be part of this network. There are many organisations throughout Havering who now know about Food Bank and can offer vouchers to folk they feel are in need. Jan Stainer would often come down to RBC on a Monday to offer words of encouragement and her encyclopaedic knowledge of Havering, and the places where we could signpost our clients in need of help was amazing! Unfortunately her job contract was not renewed this year due to lack of funding and she will no longer be on hand to assist us... but we will manage. Jan held a farewell tea where we met other volunteers from our network, which was very interesting.

Jan will be greatly missed but hopefully we should meet with her in her new capacities working with the Street Pastors and Hope for Havering.

Please remember the Food bank in your prayers, especially our team of volunteers at RBC.
