The Reformation and Martin Luther



The 500th Anniversary of the Protestant Reformation was on 31st October 2017. On that day five hundred years ago, a

German monk and theology professor called Martin Luther launched a protest against certain beliefs and practices of the Roman Catholic Church – at that time almost the only church in Central and Western Europe (Eastern Europe had the Eastern Orthodox Church and was not affected by these events). He nailed a list of ninety-five 'theses' (or arguments) to the door of a church in the town of Wittenberg as a way of publicising his view.

Luther had felt driven to speak out against the practice of the sale of 'indulgences'. According to this system, people could buy time off from purgatory when they died. The Church used this as a way to raise money. Luther believed that only God could forgive sins, and he felt that indulgences were a terrible abuse.

The Church authorities responded negatively to Luther's arguments, trying to silence him, rather than seriously considering if he might have a point. Luther responded by becoming more and more radical and denied the Catholic Church's authority, along with a lengthening list of its doctrines.

By 1520 Luther had been warned by the Pope that he would be excommunicated if he did not recant his ideas. Instead, Luther called on the princes of Germany to reform the church, a direct blow against the Pope and the Catholic hierarchy. In 1521 he was ex-communicated by the Pope.

Many German princes responded to Luther's call by re-organising the churches in their areas in line with Luther's principles, and the movement soon spread to England, parts of France, Scandinavia, and parts of Poland and Hungary. In 1529 the pro-Luther principalities of Germany issued a 'Protestation' against the Catholics, and the movement became known as 'Protestant' as a result. Very quickly during the 1520s, Western Europe divided into Catholic areas and Protestant ones.

Among the new doctrines Luther taught were:

 Justification by faith alone – we cannot earn our salvation by good works

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- The Bible alone as the authority for the Church – not the Church hierarchy, nor its tradition
- The priesthood of all believers
- The non-existence of Purgatory
- Mary and the saints should not be worshipped or prayed to
- The clarity of the Bible ie ordinary people could read it and understand it
- Confessing our sins to Jesus, not to a priest
- The bread and wine at communion do not literally turn into Christ's body and blood, and communion is not a re-enactment of Jesus' crucifixion

Luther also wrote a new translation of the Bible, in German. Formerly almost all Bibles in Western Europe had been in Latin, so he was giving a readable Bible to ordinary people for the first time.

Luther's teaching gave people freedom to come to God directly, not through a priest, and freedom to read God's



Word for themselves, instead of having to believe whatever the priests said. For his time, this was all revolutionary.

Book Review



His Place

In her own words she says, "Let me briefly tell you a few of these lessons ... He taught me that He did not want to take His work from me but that He wanted 'me': that even His work should not have His place - the first place in my heart."

I think we see this in Luke's Gospel chapter 10:38-42 when Jesus visits the home of Martha and Mary. Martha busies herself 'doing' while her sister sits at the Master's feet listening to Him. Of course, Martha felt put out that her sister was neglecting her duties, and comments on the fact to our Lord, who replies, "Martha, Martha, you are worried and upset about many

> things but one thing is needed. Mary has chosen what is better and it will not be taken from her ... For Mary it was far more important than the duties and customs of hospitality to sit at Jesus feet and take pleasure in

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His presence.

When our work for God becomes a heavy load and wearies us, and even then, tired and lacking in energy, we press on regardless to achieve more, it may be that in these moments we need to remind ourselves that Jesus said, "The work of God is this: to believe in the one He has sent." John 6:29

He also reminds us in Matthew 11:28-30, "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy and my burden is light."

I think it is a joy to Him if we take time to sit at His feet and enjoy His presence.

Scripture Union celebrate 150 years



Big things grow out of little things. A meeting with a few children in somebody's front room in London 150 years ago was the inspiration for what has grown to be an international, interdenominational outreach ministry which has touched the lives of hundreds of thousands of people worldwide.

SU had very humble beginnings. It started in 1867 with one man who simply wanted to share the Good News of Jesus with young people. He was Josiah Spiers, who that year unintentionally pioneered a new, less formal approach to sharing Jesus with children, when he shared his Christian faith with 15 youngsters in a drawing room in Islington, London.

The children responded to his warmth with such enthusiasm that soon another meeting was held, and then another. The meetings grew rapidly and soon the Children's Special Service Mission was formed, later becoming Scripture Union.

When the following year, in 1868, Spiers went on holiday to Llandudno in North Wales, he decided to try holding a children's meeting on the beach. He wrote 'God is love' in the sand, and this simple but compelling message attracted the attention of local young people. Through games and stories Josiah Spiers empowered his young audience to engage with Jesus.

Much has changed since then, but the big idea is still the same. For it was *through involvement in their activities*, that Josiah Spiers positioned himself where he could share the Good News with the young people, *just where they were*.

Fast forward 150 years, and now the beaches may have been replaced by Instagram, Youtube and the sports field, but the mission and the message of Scripture Union remains the same.

In Havering, the Scripture Union, represented by Graceworks, are involved in a number of schools. With more volunteers this could increase. Do collect a prayer letter from the welcome desk and remember this vital work.



Richard and Judy have their book club; BBC Radio 2 has its own book club – and now it's the turn of Bible Society to launch our own: *Bible Book Club*.

We're asking a group of people to choose a book of the Bible – any book they want to -- and read it as they would a book chosen by a book club; then to get together and chat about it informally.



book of the Bible there is a guide, written by theologian Paula Gooder, to help people probe and question

the text. It tells you things such as who the author might have been, what context the book was written in and why it was written. It also suggests questions you might like to ask as you read and, of course, what you might like to talk about when you get back together. The idea is that people will really think about what they're reading and be honest about what they found interesting, difficult or just hard work.

Bible Society's research tells us that whilst many people have read the Bible from cover-to-cover, there are also those who find that prospect daunting and stick with the books they know and those which are often easier to read and to understand.

At Bible Society, we believe the whole Bible is worth a read (including Leviticus); so that's why we are launching this new approach.

Talking about the Bible Book Club, Dr Paula Gooder, said:

The Bible is full of books, but often we only read small sections of them, and there are some books many of us never go near,' she says. 'I want Bible Book Club to remind people that the Bible is theirs to own, read, question and discuss – and if that's over a favourite drink with a group of friends, then all the better!'
