Each year I find something different catches my attention within the Easter

story. It can be the horrific nature of Jesus' death or the failure of the disciples to stay awake at the point at which Jesus needed his friends most. One year I followed the story of Simon Peter and his highs and lows of success and failure as a disciple. The narrative of the story is so rich in content, there are story lines that cause us to stop and examine ourselves, and it can bring a sense of unworthiness as we see the amazing love of God reaching down into our need and turmoil.

This year my attention has been focused on the chaos of the occasions



and the untidiness of the last supper. Yet we remember it in the service we call communion, where the smart white cloths are laid out and different people lovingly fill the small cups and

prepare a table for us to remember the death of Christ. However the first supper was not at all like that, and I wonder if, in our attempt to tidy up and sanitise the event, we have missed something of the spontaneity, the intimacy and the real engagement that was happening between Jesus and a bunch of disciples, laid out across the floor, sharing community and life together.

This Easter I invite you to join me in a search for the risen Christ in the messiness and reality that is in the world around us, and not be afraid of discovering that the Christian life and worship is not about neatness, but it is far more about an earthed reality. Jesus wants to break out of our humanmade order, to the disorder of God that brings wholeness to chaos.


















Trip to Brazil



Thank you for praying about my trip to Brazil. I went via Lisbon to Recife on an evening flight, and arrived at 4.30 am local time. After a stopover at my friend Gracas on Sunday, then a two-hour flight on Monday afternoon to Belo Horizonte, and had to wait almost an hour at the airport to be met by two friends who said they went to the wrong gate! I stayed with a friend, Maria das Gracas, a youthful 82-year-old.

My first job was sorting out all the material accumulated for Brigade work, which was stored in various places and latterly in a backroom of Maria's son's house. There were damp papers and droppings of a certain nature! But I was able to salvage enough to fill a barrel, 2 large suitcases and some boxes. We had several meetings to elect some people to be legally responsible for the working of Brigade, and to organise a committee with the remit of

preparing the syllabus for the future companies as well as training future leaders and organizing uniform.

There are some groups in formation in 3 churches - Methodist, Baptist and Pentecostal churches.

Please pray: For the progress of these groups, that they will soon be organized into companies. For the provision of adequate storage place as a central office for all the brigade material. For the leaders/officers and all who are responsible for the organization of this work. Some names for your prayers: Anderson, Vanessa, Ana Paula, Antonio, Claudia, Irineu, Maria de Carmo, Maria das Gracas, Diana, Cristiano and Elieiza.

My time in Belo went all too quickly, I do hope it would be possible to return next year, God's willing, to celebrate the growth of Brigade.

The Reformation

2. Zwingli and Calvin



Luther was the high profile leader of the Reformation at the start, but soon other teachers who would go further

than him started to emerge.

Huldrych Zwingli came to prominence as an influential Protestant leader in the Swiss city of Zurich during the

1520s. At first he seemed to be following Luther, but gradually he started to develop his own ideas which went much further away from



Catholicism. In 1529 he had a major disagreement with Luther over the issue of the Lord's Supper. Zwingli said that the Supper was purely symbolic and that nothing happened in it, apart from people remembering what Jesus had done. Luther insisted that Jesus had said 'This is my body'. This opened up a major and long-lasting rift between the followers of Luther, and the movement which called itself 'Reformed'.

Zwingli died in 1531, but the Reformed



movement continued. Ten years later, a Frenchman, Jean Calvin, was appointed by the independent city state of Geneval to lead its

church. For the next twenty-five years until his death he became the dominant thinker of the Reformed movement.

Calvin's significance lay in his teaching, and his Europe-wide influence at the time

At first he and Luther respected each other, but his views on the Lord's Supper eventually divided them. Calvin taught that in communion, the spiritual realities symbolised by the bread and the wine were really given to the communicants. Unlike Zwingli, Calvin thought that something actually happened when Christians took communion, but he could not agree with Luther that the bread was Jesus' body.

Calvin is also known for his teaching that:

God predestines people to believe or not believe in God

God is sovereign and in control of everything

Images and dancing should be banned

The church should do only what Christ commanded (whereas Luther thought it was only important to avoid what Christ condemned, otherwise there was freedom)

Godly (ie Reformed) magistrates could resist ungodly and tyrannical kings. (This was politically revolutionary for the time.)

Unlike Luther, Calvin had a high view of the Old Testament, and saw it as having almost equal importance to the New Testament.

Whereas Lutheran influence was largely limited to Germany and Scandinavia, the Reformed movement rapidly gained followers in such widely spread places as Scotland, France, Poland and Hungary and....England.


Another friend told me that his exneighbour had been prosecuted by the
