A short story from the Bible



Moses talked ... for 40 days and nights



Well, here it is, my final GV as Minister at RBC - and what a journey it has been! God used a time of sickness in my life to steer me into position so that I could begin serving RBC, keeping the "youth work going" whilst the church sought God's leading for a new youth pastor, little knowing that God would soon be calling me to this role. 18 years on and I have served as youth, children's, and families Minister, moving on to becoming the Minister with a focus on the community.

Back in 2006, struggling with M.E., I never thought that this horrible, debilitating illness could be used by God. But looking back now from this perspective I can see that God was working in all things in my life to bring glory to His name (Romans 8:28), the good and the bad, the happy and the sad, the mountains and the valleys. It's all about trust isn't it? That Fantastic Adventure In Trusting Him - having faith in our God who never lets us down, who is always faithful.

I know I would never have chosen to be ill and yet it was directly as a result that I began serving God in RBC... God's ways are certainly beyond our ways, but as we know, God sees the beginning from the end, He knows the paths we will take, and He offers to be our Shepherd, to guide us every step of the way - that is the most wonderful, freeing, truth that we need to hold on to with both hands especially when the path is tough.

Not hearing this, the congregation responded: "And also with vou."





Giving wildlife a helping hand from our doorstep

I've just been enjoying the evening sun in my small garden and it gives me an enormous sense of joy and wellbeing. Last week, great tits fledged from their box and sparrows are nesting in a small 'colony' box. I also saw a frog (or toad as I can't tell the difference!). However, I'm also plagued with snails that are eating my vegetable seedlings (but also the dying vegetation, so that's good!). The wildlife in my garden is certainly hard at work but it needs a helping hand. For example, so many driveways are covered in hard paving; many lawns are covered in plastic grass; some gardens are kept so pristine, there is not much that is 'natural' about them and our fences prevent hedgehogs roaming to feed.

As I said last time, even the smallest patch can make a contribution. Here are some ideas for you to help the wildlife that wants to be in your garden, balcony or window box:

Make a 'bug' hotel by tying a bundle of twigs together with smaller twigs and dead leaves stuffed in between and cover with an old roof tile. Place in an undisturbed sheltered spot to create a space for solitary bees, spiders and woodlice etc. You will benefit from nurturing an environment for bugs as they will prey on pests.

Buy a birdbox, perhaps from the RSPB where you can get advice on different types of boxes and preferred locations. Birds visiting and nesting in your garden space can then feed on some of your 'hotel' residents!

Create a water feature. This can be a saucer of water filled with marbles so bees and birds can come to drink, especially on extremely hot days. Or, sink a waterproof container or old sink and fill with some rocks and an access ramp for amphibians to get in and out. Then, preferably fill with rainwater. Purchase some plants to suit the size of your feature. Then wait and see what arrives over the next few months!

Don't be tempted to keep your flower beds too tidy. Fallen leaves and petals can help increase organic matter in your soil to aid water retention and prevent weed growth. A variety of flowers that flower at different times of the year are not only beautiful to look at but also offer pollinators essential sources of food.

Consider giving a patch of lawn to wildflowers that attract pollinating insects (not just bees). Simply stop mowing the lawn to see what wild flowers grow or remove an area of grass and sow a wildflower seed mix. An organisation called Plantlife has created a movement called #NoMowMay: Don't mow this May and let it grow! Provide a feast for pollinators, tackle pollution, reduce urban heat extremes and lock away atmospheric carbon below ground.

Romans Chapter 8 and the Environment

On Wednesday evenings this year we have been studying Paul's letter to the Romans, using a study guide produced by the Bible Society and presented by Andrew Ollerton. So far much of it has been a more detailed look at a number of themes that are moderately familiar. When we look at chapter 8 of Romans, we encounter some ideas which we do not usually hear about in church. We meet Paul's ideas about our future resurrection, as bodies, not just spirits. We find that Paul expects the whole of creation, ie the whole universe, to be renewed, 'and come into the freedom of the children of God' when Jesus returns. This leads Andrew Ollerton to say, among many other things, that we need to be involved in caring for the environment. Below are some extracts from Andrew Ollerton's presentation of Romans 8:

'Paul describes our future hope in vivid colour.

It's so much more material and physical than we have perhaps dared to imagine – it's not souls wafting in the clouds, it's about bones and bodies being resurrected like Jesus, and then enjoying a beautifully restored new creation.

So (when) the early Christians buried martyrs and loved ones, they wrapped them in linen cloth imitating the burial of Jesus, and anticipating their resurrection to be with Jesus. What a prospect! As Paul says in Romans Chapter 8, 'in this hope we were saved'.'

'So what do we have to look forward to according to Romans 8? Well Paul high-lights two amazing aspects:

A new creation - and a new body

One of the most striking features of Romans 8 is the close relationship between humans and the natural environment.

We (humans) were originally entrusted with the task of stewarding the world to the glory of God. According to the Bible it's our selfishness and greed that has resulted in so much damage, including floods and droughts, global warming and plastic waste.

However, follow the logic in the opposite direction. What if a new humanity could emerge, who were purged of sin and perfectly reflecting God's image. Then the entire planet could flourish once more. Romans 8 has this hope in mind. Paul is fundamentally positive about the future of planet earth because God's grace will ultimately triumph over human sin.

After all, that's the Gospel, and it works on a personal level ('I'm saved!'), on a social level ('we're reunited') and also on a cosmic level ('creation itself will be liberated'). God's work is not limited to just 'spiritual things'. Redemption includes dolphins and daisies and deserts. So with this hope in mind Paul reinterprets the trauma of the natural world: 'the whole of creation has been groaning as in the pains of childbirth'. (Romans 8:22)

As a pregnant woman labours to deliver something beautiful, so the current challenges of the natural environment are reframed by the hope of Romans 8. One day God will renew the entire world and it will flourish once more.

This hope should motivate us to be better stewards of planet earth now. Precisely

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It seems to me that the true meaning of Easter has sadly been lost somewhat over the years. For many it's become nothing more than a two week holiday where we're inundated with chocolate eggs, easter chicks and fluffy bunnies! Easter is of course one of the most important dates on the Christian calendar however so this inspired a scene in my mind's eye to take place as I pictured someone coming to me and asking,

"What's Good Friday all about?" In response my reply would be,

"Come with me, I'll show you."

I've written this poem from the point of view that I'm literally bringing someone to the foot of the Cross and asking them to look up at their Saviour as He dies to pay for the sins of the world.

Ultimately I pray this poem can be used many times to share the true meaning of Good Friday and how deeply important Christ's sacrifice was. I hope it can inspire the non-believer to really consider where they stand with Jesus in their heart. Knowing that He laid down His life to pay for their sin I hope this poem helps each soul to see how much God loves them so that they might come to know and love their Saviour personally.

I also pray that these words can inspire those who already know Christ as their Saviour to give thanks once again for the incredible work He did on the Cross on Crucifixion Day. Whether it's Good Friday or any other day of the year, I hope this poem can inspire us all to fix our eyes on lesus and look up!

<u>Chaplains keep faith in</u> football



Chaplains are playing a vital role in the Premier League and other leagues across the UK.

Currently 11 English Premier League clubs and 55 Football League clubs have chaplains, with some clubs having more than one. There are also chaplains throughout the National League and in lower league clubs. The growth in women's football has led to more chaplains being appointed to serve women's teams.

Matt Baker is National Director for England overseeing all of English Sport for Sports Chaplaincy UK. He combines the role with being chaplain at London's Charlton Athletic, a position he has held since March 2000.

He explains: "The role of the chaplain is to be pastorally proactive and spiritually reactive. This means being regularly present, listening and supporting people whether they have a faith or not.

"From a spiritual perspective an example of this was when a player asked me 15 years ago whether I would pray with him before a game. On the first occasion there were a couple of players and we prayed together before every game for the rest of that season.

"This has continued ever since as there
