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Memories of 90 Years at RBC

Apart from my time away at College, I have always attended RBC. I was baptised here in 1948, married here in 1955 and my daughter was dedicated here in 1958. Since then, Thanksgiving services were held both for my daughter, who died aged 14, and for my husband in 2021.

My brother, who is seven years older than me, remembers walking with my mother to the opening of the church. She was pushing me in the pram! So began my 90 years with this wonderful church.

However, my earliest recollection is when I was five years old. It was the day of the Sunday School Anniversary and I had to stand on the front pew, facing the congregation and sing the first verse of a children's hymn on my own, and I still remember the words! *God made little robin in the days of spring, 'Please' said little robin, 'when am I to sing? When am I to sing?'* I wouldn't do it now. Nor would you want to hear me!

Sunday School Anniversaries were always one of the highlights of the church year. For two or three weeks before the day, all the Sunday School Departments, except the youngest, came together as part of our afternoons, to practice special hymns to be sung on the Anniversary day. With the help of a very strict conductor, I think we made a joyful noise. I loved it, but not every child was of the same opinion! Usually there would be a special, visiting preacher and in the afternoon it was a tradition that many of us would go to tea with our Sunday School teachers, before returning to church for the evening service.

In those days, the evening services were the most well-attended. We didn't have a music group, but we did have a choir which sat on each side of the organ console, which was in the centre then. Sopranos and tenors sat to the right and bass and alto singers to the left. We were always interested to see what hats the ladies would be wearing. During the service, the choir sang an anthem and at Easter they usually 'performed' a cantata such as 'Olivet to Calvary'. At one time we had a men's group which was really excellent and made a recording of some of their music. Neil Walden will remember this and, I believe, he is the only one of the group still 'with us'.

War years:

These were of course difficult years, but as far as possible, Sunday services and other meetings and activities continued to take place. Air raids weren't as frequent in the daytime as at night,

but I can remember on occasions if the siren went off, some of the women and children were ushered down into the boiler room, or the 'coal house' as we called it. There wasn't too much room down there, so I'm sure not everyone fitted in. I believe there was also an air raid shelter on the land now occupied by the DSS building.

In the winter, we had to put 'black-outs' up at the windows for the evening services or we could have been in trouble with the air raid warden and told to 'put that light out'! 'Black outs' were made of heavy black material which was attached to specially made wooden frames which were fitted to the windows. I can only imagine that a group of people came down before it got dark to put them up.

Every night there were volunteers who stayed in the building, ready with their

buckets of water, so that if an incendiary bomb fell on the church, they would be there to help extinguish any fire that might break out until the Fire Brigade arrived.

A large number of our young men and women were away in the armed forces on active service. Many of the members, including the pastor V.J. Smith, kept in touch with them regularly. Sadly, a number of them didn't return and their names are to be found on the brass plaque at the back of the church.

During the war years there was a German Prisoner of War camp, somewhere between Gallows Corner and Gubbins Lane. They came down to join us after the war had finished, while waiting for their repatriation. The prisoners were allowed a certain amount of freedom and at the invitation of Main Road Church (RBC), some of

them came down and joined in the activities with YPF (Young Peoples' Fellowship). I can remember one occasion when we met together in the garden of a large house in Junction Road. I believe the house was called 'Waverley' and may have belonged to a lady called Nellie Sims who was a local florist. V.J. Smith also kept two or three of his beehives there.

There is a photo of this gathering (dated 1947) in Ken Duffin's book 'Fifty Years On'. I'm sitting in the first row! Some of the prisoners also attended the Sunday Services and were conspicuous by their prison uniforms. They were always made welcome! I wonder whether any of them are still alive and remember those days?

Evening services always concluded with the singing of a lovely hymn. One verse said:-

God be with you till we meet again When life's perils thick confound you Put His arms securely round you God be with you till we meet again.

In such dangerous times, with bombs falling all around, none of us knew whether that would be here on Earth or in Heaven!

More recently:

One milestone in the life of RBC was that during the ministry of Norman Wright, he 'exchanged pulpits' with a pastor from Redlands California for three months or so. I think his name was Bob Wallace. Towards the end of his time here, he challenged us to try having some Home Groups. The following Wednesday, a number of members invited others to their homes for Bible Study, prayers and fellowship. Such was their 'success' that to the best of my knowledge, they have continued in one form or another ever since.

There is so much more that I could tell, but just one more thing. I remember when the proposal for the extension to the front of the church was being discussed at a church meeting, one person stood up and said, "It would be an enormous waste of money. The space would hardly ever be used." Now, I don't know how we would manage without it, especially with the blessings The Meeting Place brings to so many different people.

I count it an enormous privilege to have lived through all the pastorates here at RBC, each one different, each one facing its own difficulties and challenges, each one so vital in the building up and reaching out of God's people here.




After the reading, the young people took part in crafts.

Fire Watching at Main Road Baptist Church

I started Fire Watching Duty jointly with Philip Harvey during Wednesday nights in 1943. That is a long time ago, and while most of what I have to relate is from memory, I still have letters I wrote to my girlfriend Joyce Gower which include references to incidents that occurred from time to time.

To get some idea of when my involvement with Fire Watching started, l must go back to my 16th Birthday (January 1942) when I was permitted to work on the night shift. This I did almost continually, first operating a capstan lathe, then later as the Chargehand in the Press Shop. I estimate that I returned to working the day shift by the end of April 1943 and would have been in a position to Fire Watch at night. I was surprised to find from the letters I wrote to loyce, that I continued to attend until 16th May 1944.

I cannot remember to whom we were responsible or who gave us instructions, someone must have shown us how to get on to the church roof from inside because I cannot remember using a ladder externally. We slept, fully clothed on the floor in the Deacon's Vestry and that doesn't mean we had a mattress. If the air raid siren sounded we had to be up, awake and alert.

On the night of the 19th May 1943 both Philip and myself had attended an extended Praver Meeting in the School Room so were late commencing our duties, nevertheless we had time to find a way to get on to the School Room roof without the aid of a ladder. As a result we were late getting to sleep, only to be woken up by the Air

Raid Siren. Fortunately the All Clear sounded soon after and we were asleep again. Consequently we didn't wake up until 06:45.

It is apparent from the letters that I called at Philip's home on my bicycle before we travelled together to the church. More often than not Philip would still be eating his supper and I would be invited to join him despite the fact that I'd already had mine. I vaguely remember that the nominal time to commence duty was 7pm but I don't think we were very prompt. Normally the rear of the church would be open, with people in attendance, but I can't remember what the arrangements were if we arrived later. Fast forward to the occasion I described in letter dated 26th April 1944 when I had this to say:-

"When we arrived on fire watch last night all the doors were locked and there were no keys to be found. We (probably me) got in through a window. As we knew where the other keys were kept we could open the door from inside".

Whilst that was an isolated occasion, it also indicates what the norm would have been. As far as the arrangement in the morning was concerned, it is possible that a Caretaker arrived before we were due to leave and was probably the person who woke us.

Returning to 1943, while it was still light on the 26th May we explored the roof of the church and reached the top of the highest part. Back on a level area we practiced using the Stirrup (Continued on page 9)

Sometimes we are asked to research particular topics of interest to them such as 'squirrels!

Audrey Gostling has joined us on occasions for a sing-song. At Christmas we celebrated our Lord's birthday with carols, readings, poems, games and a visit from Father Christmas.

All our visits aim to stimulate the residents and allow them to share things with us. We encourage them to participate as much as they feel able and we get so very much from them.

Not all of us can go every time, but do so as often as possible, and our thanks go to Irene Bracken, Keith Carter, Beryl Curtis, Dougie Cresswell, Brian Loveard, Daphne May, Kathy Pomeroy and Maureen Smith for making time to visit our friends. We are touched by the frequent expressions of appreciation that we receive from so many of the residents.

We are convinced that God is in these activities, as both residents and visitors alike have been blessed by these evenings together.

When I reached around the age of 19, like many others I guess, I drifted from the Church, more confident in the view that I was independent and wanted to make my own way in life. Here's where I find my Christian journey most interesting; for many years I didn't go to Church, didn't pray regularly and didn't consider myself a badge-wearing Christian. However, looking back on those years now - I know that the Lord was with me throughout at every point, helping me with important decisions and guiding me through. The strong influence of the fellowship and teaching that I got from my younger days at Romford Baptist Church had influenced my character, work ethics, and behaviour - even though I wasn't an "active" Christian.

Fast forward and I'm now 56 years young and have, for many years, been a member of my village Church in Orsett and have again been able to enjoy a wonderful Church family.

It just goes to show that things that are taught, activities hosted, outreach projects initiated and even just small chats to one another at Romford Baptist Church may not yield immediate visible results but can plant a tiny seed that yields fruit in the future. Many people that influenced my early life at RBC have since received their calling and wouldn't know the lasting impressions they left on me, and how I've used those teachings positively throughout my life.

Finally, I would like to mention Parkside. I was there when Rev Norman P Wright opened Parkside. I used to visit, with Sunday School and Boys Brigade, where we'd help out or sing a song to the residents. I also remember my Mum making cakes for the residents and fundraisers with my Dad to help initially raise capital for Parkside (and Heathside).

When Norman Wright had his passionate vision for Parkside, all those years ago, I never really visualised both my Mum and Dad living there when they got old. Here I am today, with both of them happily living there. It's this that's helped me reconnect with my early Church roots too.

What started as Norman's vision - a Christian home where the elderly would be looked after in a comforting inclusive environment - is still going strong all these years later.

To me it's further proof that we, as Christians, may never see all the results of our actions - but we can be safe in the knowledge that anything we do, even the smallest things, may have a big influence, through Christ, on others - even long after we receive our calling.

Pumps and found a way to refill the pails with water from the tank inside the roof. I don't think Philip and I had ever been involved with extinguishing an incendiary bomb but we Knew the rules to obey. Fortunately we were not faced with that task while I was on duty at the church.

I clearly remember one occasion when we were on the roof in darkness during an air raid, when we could see what was going on in the region of IIford. Multiple rockets were being launched near vertically, simultaneously and exploding at low altitude. We had heard later, on the "Grape vine". that the rockets were attached to a vast network of ironware which supported further explosive devices. It was obviously being used to defend some very important facility against low flying raiders. From where we were standing we could see it light up the night sky.

Few letters were written during the summer of 1943 but apart from the holiday I spent at Southwold, I would imagine that I went on fire watch a number of times during that period. The next reference was made in a letter dated 9th December 1943, when I remarked that it was midnight before we went to sleep but only because we had been 'fussing' around with our cycles.

References made in January 1944 not only imply that I was still firewatching, but on occasions it was on Tuesday night. In a letter dated 15th February 1944, I wrote:- "you should have seen my cycle when I was going down to firewatch. A good load on the back. I had my cape and pyjamas in the saddle bag, tin hat on top, and on one side of the carrier a gas mask and on the other side my work overalls". It appears that I had refined my sleeping attire since the start!

Letters dated 7th & 30th March, 12th, 19th, and of course 26th April 1944 all indicate attendance at firewatching. During the night of the 3rd May 1944 very high winds caused the Blackout panels to fall off the windows and one knocked my tin hat down. It gave us quite a shock. I had never seen Philip get up so quickly.

The last recorded occasion was on 16" May 1944 when I wrote:- " I am on firewatch tonight and we are going down early so we can get on the roof. Haven't been up there for months. Don't worry I shall see you before this gets to you." Joyce was in the WRNS then and I left home to join the RAF on the 13th June 1944.

Joyce and Don were married by 'VJ' Smith on 4 June 1949.





As Romford Baptist Church approaches another milestone I thought I'd share a handful of fond memories I have from a childhood that was very closely associated with the Church.

My mum took my two brothers & I from the late 1960s.

My earliest memory is when I was about 5 years old. Happily skipping down the isle, mid service, to attend Sunday School. I would always dress as a cowboy and had great fun "shooting" the Rev Norman P Wright in his pulpit as I passed by on the way to the hall.

I loved Sunday school. I remember how busy it was with lots of children in attendance. We used to have a group address followed by independent smaller groups at tables. We used to get merit cards for achievements, which we could then spend on various items on the prize table.

Perhaps one of the clearest memories is when the tv programme "Morning Worship" came to do a live television broadcast of a service in the 70s. I remember choosing a seat on the aisle to be sure that I'd get on telly. With my best angelic face firmly fixed, I didn't have to wait long for a camera to pick me up and viewers across the uk saw me fill their screen for a good 7 seconds.

As I grew up, I attended the Boys Brigade. Firstly in the junior section and latterly the senior section. We were a well-attended company - The mighty 2nd Romford. It was there that I forged many great friends and learned





many a skill to carry forward in my life. I'll always remember the great leader Brian Little. assisted by John Wright and many others whose commitment to that company was second to none. The annual BB camps instilled both independence and comradeship based on the solid foundation of Christianity, even though the fun camp initiation ceremonies wouldn't comply with health and safety nowadays:)

As I got older, I recall having many a challenging discussion with others at Church Youth Group in the Youth Lounge, where topics from drug addiction to the second coming of Christ would be enthusiastically discussed, enlightening us and making us all more aware of things around us as we progressed in age.
