Joshua led the Israelites across the river Jordan. They camped near the town of Jericho and prepared to fight.





























Secretary's page

Pruning My Sinful Brambles



During the Christmas holidays, I took on the daunting task of cutting back what felt like acres of vicious brambles which had taken hold of our little side garden. Intertwined with painful stinging nettles, it was an unenviable task! The overgrown jungle was so intertwined that it was hard to see where one thorny stem started or finished. The only option was to don a pair of sturdy gardening gloves and pull out shorter pieces, chopping them up and filling my green garden wheelie bin. It took hours! Little by little, cutting off a couple of feet at a time and snipping with secateurs. It took determination. motivation and patience to work my way through what seemed like an insurmountable job at the beginning.

While I was working and getting into some sort of slow-but-steady rhythm, God used this horrible task to teach me an important lesson. He showed me that sin, when left undealt with, simply works its way into every aspect of my life. Not really noticed at first, perhaps not even causing that much of a problem. But left untended and allowed to grow, it can impact me daily and give Satan a foothold.


I'm not talking about the sins I consider 'huge' like murder and theft. I'm talking about those 'little' sins – like talking extra time for my break, or joining in with gossip. It's easy to validate these little things I come across day to day, especially when it feels justified. But on that day when my fingers and arms were constantly scratched and pierced with thorns, God revealed that these little things (which of course are not from Christ) can be spiritually pruned back, one small piece at a time.

Change is hard, especially when I'm influenced by those around me. In my staff room, I can find myself so easily drawn into discussions which are not Christ-like. Just like the brambles which creep up on my garden and work their way in between the trees and shed walls. Before I know it, I'm speaking about someone in a way I shouldn't. I've asked God to help me prune back this sinful bramble, even sometimes leaving the staff room so I cannot be tempted to join in. With God's help and strength, I try and make a conscious effort to see the good in the person I would otherwise speak of unkindly.

Watch and pray so that you will not fall into temptation.' Matthew 26:41

My sinful brambles keep on growing of course. I need God's daily forgiveness, grace and strength to help keep them at bay. I do see change, but it's not always in one big 'Damascus epiphany'. Sometimes it's just a little thing, like not yelling at the driver who cuts me

if there's someone else in the car and annoys the devil no end!

The thorns digging into my arms and fingers were a moving reminder of the thorns which pierced our dear Saviour's head, representing the brambles of sin in each of our lives which He bore on the cross.

At the end of my 5 hours work, the garden was clear, the wheelie bin was full and I felt happy that a horrible but needed job had been finished. But I know I'll need to revisit the garden soon, to trim back the regrowth before it gets out of hand: at least it should be an easier job if I do that. I need to maintain my own daily choices and prune back my sinful brambles. If I maintain those areas of my life where I know I'm weak then, within God's strength, I'll be less likely to succumb to temptation. But any gardener will tell you; it's a never-ending job. So, I'll continue asking God for help pruning them back, so they will not take hold in the same way. I want to leave room for flowers to bloom in my spiritual garden so His glory may shine.
