#### Reflections

As I reach the end of my second term as a deacon, I was thinking about all that we have lived through – world wide and within our Church. We have seen Britain leave Europe, witnessed President Trump come and go (and come again), endured a pandemic that introduced us to the joys and frustrations of Zoom – I had a about a 3 second "drive" to the Leadership Meetings. It is difficult to remember a time before Zoom.

Personally, I think one of the most profound changes has been that we stream our services; this has extended our Church's reach. What once was a broadcast for members alone has become a global ministry, open to anyone willing to watch. To date, our services have been viewed in over 50 countries, spanning continents and cultures. The thought that our message has touched lives from Australia to Zimbabwe reminds me that faith knows no borders.

One rather unexpected impact of our online presence came after the pandemic, when a former member now living in America cited our Church's example to justify communion without physical gathering. It is remarkable how far our practices and discussions can ripple outward, shaping conversations in ways we never imagined.

One of the unexpected joys of being a deacon has been the Leadership meetings. I'll admit, after a long day at work, the thought of yet another meeting rarely excites me. Yet, I have never once walked away thinking, well, that

was terrible. Quite the opposite - our meetings are warm, jovial, and filled with laughter (yes, even with agendas in hand). We receive our "party packs" of papers in advance. And while decisions are made, these meetings never fail to reinforce the friendship and unity that underpin our leadership.

I have often thought about the 90:10 rule - that in many churches, 90% of the work is carried by 10% of the people. Romford Baptist Church is no different. Let me be clear this is not meant to guilt trip anyone! Life is busy, circumstances vary, and not everyone can commit the time and reading. Serving on the Leadership Team is a time commitment

So, what's next for me? Well, thankfully much like Jumoke, we haven't been cast out completely. I'll continue working on the Church website and on Grapevine. Assuming, of course, that the Editor doesn't decide my tenure should end there too!

#### **Foodbank**



In 2024 our Foodbanks gave out 5144 parcels of food to residents within our community here. A "normal" reaction to that would be "oh wow that's amazing?", and whilst it is great we have been able to provide that support, our reaction should be: "What can we do to reduce and stop the need for foodbanks?".

That was the challenge and conversation of the day at Trussell's Rolling Roadshow for 2025. Alison and I spent a day with other Foodbanks looking at the challenges and opportunities for Foodbanks over the next 5 years. The day started with a time of prayer, which gave us the grounding for the day. We were encouraged, shared ideas and got to know others who had the same heart and compassion that we do for those in need of Foodbanks. We both left the day feeling and knowing we are part of a wider collection of people across the UK wanting to make a change.

There were two stand-out quotes of the day that have been left with me, one which was a quote from Desmond Tutu: "We've got to stop fishing people out of the water, we need to go up stream and see why they are falling in". How does that relate to Foodbanks? The Foodbank can't be the solution, we need to see what is leading them to the foodbank and what can be done to stop people needing the foodbanks.

That does seem very overwhelming against the contrast of life in 2025 and Food bank volume of people accessing food-banks, but that also leads to my second quote: "Stubborn hope - remain stubborn in your hope that things will change".

> It's been nearly two years since the Collier Row and Romford Foodbanks moved under Romford Baptist Church Community Care (RBCCC) and we will be starting to look at the next stage of the foodbanks, i.e. a Foodbank is more than just the food, it is giving those who use them dignity, and support to deal with their everyday solutions.

> You were all brilliant in responding to the Lent appeal, but we still ran out of certain foods just a few weeks later, which shows the need for support is ongoing. There are still regular ways you can get involved:

- Pray our Foodbanks are held on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, please pray on those days, pray for the volunteers, pray for those who attend the foodbank and pray that the food doesn't run out.
- Please select an item from the foodbank list: the weekly notice sheet lists what essential items are needed that week. When you are shopping, please if you can select an item and bring it down to RBC.
- Alternatively, contribute a regular form of financial donation to the foodbank, either through the offering bags, the card machine in The



#### **Thomas England**

Many of you will know that a group of rather 'ancient' Girl Guides are often gathered in The Meeting Place', so should not be surprised when the tracking skills of our founder B.P. recently found a useful occupation at Romford Baptist Church.

It all started when eagle-eyed Valerie spotted this foundation stone inserted in the outside right-hand wall of the church. After reporting her find to her Trefoil Guild friends, they then started on a quest which has revealed the sto-



ry of an interesting man - a discreet and amazingly generous Christian benefactor who has enriched the lives of many in Romford's past and, through his legacy, continues to do so today.



Born in Yorkshire, Thomas **England** came Romford as a voung man to work as a pharmacist in the shop on the corner opposite the 'Golden Lion' on the High Street. He eventually

bought the shop and through his industry and acute business acumen, he was able to invest in land, which from the early 20<sup>th</sup> century he saw would become the drivers of profit. Of course, those instincts proved correct and becoming a very wealthy man, he then set about generously helping the local community.



For many years he gave his time either advising or formally serving on Romford Council when land for building

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flourished between the wars. He also had a vision of green spaces stretching across the borough connecting Raphael Park to Bedfords Park; and this was fulfilled by Thomas England's donation of nearly 25 acres of land to create Rise Park - a walking corridor created in 1937 which has since been enjoyed by generations of many young people and happy families.

Fortunately, Thomas England and his wife Esther were a pair well suited. Working together, with Christian ideals as practicing Methodists, they used their good fortune for many causes besides parks, scout halls and new church buildings. They were always discreet, often their name was not given as the donor and even after death, it is not the name 'England' that is used for the continuance of their legacy.

Search out the name 'Norwood & Newton Settlement' and you will find just how many churches are the beneficiaries of their Christian generosity, for by using the maiden names of both their mothers, Thomas & Esther England continue to help churches in Havering and many out of the borough.

... and for the Trefoil Guild, well we are off to try to spot more evidence of similar good works.

The vicar was ill in hospital and so the churchwarden went to visit. Trying to cheer him up, the churchwarden said: "We missed you at PCC last


night. We even put forward a resolution to wish you a speedy recovery. It was passed by 14 votes to 12."






