Shadows

I was turning out some papers and I came across a bookmark I had bought when my husband and I visited Biggin Hill Airfield. During the Second World War it was an RAF base for Spitfires and Hurricanes. We were able to look round the chapel and at one end there was an arch and written at the top were words from Psalm 63 (AV). "In the shadow of Thy wing will I rejoice". It seemed so appropriate as I believe the RAF badge is in the form of wings.

Shadows, or shade, can be such a blessing on a hot day when we need protection from the sun's blazing rays. However, if I want to sit in the shade in my garden, I have to keep changing my position because as the sun moves across, so the area of shade keeps changing too.

lames, in his letter in the New Testament, describes God as 'the Father of Heavenly lights who does not change like shifting shadows' (James 1 v17). How reassuring this is. Our God is 'the same yesterday, today and forever'. He is always faithful. His love for us never changes, even when we forget about Him or let Him down.

In the scary world in which we live, where the news is changing almost by the minute, it is easy to become anxious and despondent. However, God is still in control of the world He created, even though we may not understand His plans or His ways. In the changing circumstances of our lives, our Father will stay close. In the shadow of His wings, His love and His mercy will give us the strength to cope when we are faced with difficult and bewildering experiences. I know this to be true.

However, shadows can be frightening. As a small child in the wartime when there was no street lighting, I used to be scared when the light from the moon cast shadows on my bedroom wall. In one of his books, the Scottish preacher John McNeil describes how he had to walk home from school through a wooded area. Odd shaped bushes and trees cast shadows as the sun began to set on winter afternoons. School friends tried to scare him with tales of robbers who they said lurked there waiting to attack him. On one particularly gloomy day, John thought he could see something or someone coming towards him. He was convinced it was one of the robbers the boys talked about. Then he heard a voice call his name. He stood paralysed with fear. This unknown person even knew his name! The voice called out again: "John, is that you?" With enormous relief, he realised it was his father who had come to meet him.

One translation of Psalm 23 v4 puts it like this: "Even when walking through the valley of the shadows, I will not be afraid for you are close beside me, guiding all the way."

The first verse of one of my favourite hymns written by Timothy Dudley-Smith, who died not so long ago, goes like this:

> Safe in the shadow in the Lord Beneath His hand and power I trust in Him, I trust in Him My fortress and my tower







Global climate change conference (CoP30)



This year's global climate change meeting (CoP 30 - '30th Conference of the Parties' to the UN framework convention on climate change) will be held in Belem, Brazil, from 10th to 21st November. Representatives of governments will also meet from 13th to 14th October in Brasilia to prepare for the main meeting.

The meeting is supposed to achieve agreements and commitments from particularly - governments, to limit global heating. Usually countries and companies with vested interests in doing nothing try frustrate the meetings.

Issues on which the meeting needs to make progress include:

- Governments committing themselves to achieving substantial cuts in greenhouse gas emissions by 2030
- Commitments make to 'adaptations' so that countries can cope with the effects of global heating (e.g. killer heatwaves,

- wildfires, floods and droughts)
- Developed country governments promising funding for poor countries to help them take action against global heat-
- Governments developing concrete plans to move away from the use of fossil fuels

This is a key opportunity for prayer. We can pray for God to guide and overrule the deliberations of officials and ministers as they negotiate with each other. We can ask God to give wisdom to diplomats so that they can find ways of achieving worthwhile agreements. We can pray that the voices of people whose lives and livelihoods are threatened by climate change will be heard, above the noise of lobbyists working for the oil companies etc. (For example, think of the people who live on low-lying islands which might be underwater in future years.)

We can also write to our MPs about this and let them know that we care about it, and that we want our government to play a constructive part.

We can play our part in a small way. Double-glazing and insulating our homes reduce our energy use, which in the long run saves money as well cutting our carbon dioxide emissions. Walking, cycling or using public transport also help. (Walking and cycling are good for our health as well.)

But not so old that she really wants to throw it away. Or, indeed, arrange for the council to collect it.


But then she remembers that what the church really needs is a second hand toaster/set of dining chairs/kettle/vacuum cleaner! And comes to you as pastor / vicar / minister / steward / churchwarden to ask if you would like the second hand item as a gift.

The first thing you should do is remember that, if it's electrical, it will be out of warranty. And the cost and effort of disposal when it breaks in the first week will be yours.

The second thing you should do is remind Mabel of Malachi 1:8. And suggest that, if Mabel thinks the church needs a toaster/set of dining chairs/kettle/vacuum cleaner, she could keep the old one and give the new one.

But that may sound like too much scripture to be quoting - and, let's face it, as liberal Anglicans that is a lot, a whole verse. While for some evangelicals it's a bit suss quoting the Hebrew Scriptures/Old Testament like that. So you may find a use for this helpful flowchart.

A Drop In The Ocean



Do you like watching nature programmes? Maybe (like me) you're a huge fan of David Attenborough's ground-breaking programmes, especially his 'Blue Planet' series? Amazing pictures of places we will probably never get to see. Incredible wild life, powerful weather, animals we didn't know even existed!

When I watch 'Blue Planet' I am always stunned and amazed about just how huge our oceans actually are. You probably already know that our oceans cover 70% of Earth's surface and contain 97% of all water on Earth. Did you also know they produce over half the oxygen we breathe too? Or that there are approximately 240,000 known species living there? Just incredible! My mind has trouble comprehending such vast number facts.

Which is why I also find it hard to comprehend the fact that my filthiest sin has been cast into the vastness of these great waters, never to be seen again. Many years ago, the Lord showed me a vision of myself standing on a sandy beach with a drop of water on my finger. I flicked the droplet off into the sea. God showed me that I would never again be able to locate and find that single drop. I could never get it back, it was hidden in the waters forever. He reminded me that once I'd

repented, my sin was cast into the sea, never to be found again. Micah 7 verse 19 says: "You will again have compassion on us; You will tread our sins underfoot and hurl all our iniquities into the depths of the sea." You've probably heard the expression 'a drop in the ocean'. Although not actually a Biblical quote, the essence of this phrase comes from this verse in Micah. I imagined my awful sin as a drop in the ocean once I'd asked God to forgive me. If He is loving enough to cast my sin into the ocean never to be seen again, why do I keep trying to find it or remember it? It was a difficult concept for me to understand. that I don't have to keep dwelling on my past or keep feeling guilty about it. Certainly I will consider my actions in the future and, with God's help, not make the same mistakes again. I find it helpful to recognise when similar feelings appear so I can make a better choice about my response next time or stay away from similar temptations in the first place.

As if the 320.3 cubic million miles of ocean wasn't enough to cover my sin, the Bible further reassures me about God's attitude to my past - Psalm 103 verse 12 says: "As far as the east is from the west, so far has He removed our transgressions from us." Consid-

ering the diameter of earth is 7,926 miles wide, then surely God means what He says when He forgives us and promises to forget our sin?

We all have things which we need God to forgive. "For all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God." (Romans 3 verse 23). I can truly confess that I frequently fall short of God's standards. But God has also taught me to let go of my past sin and not to continue feeling guilty about it. After all, He has! Bless His name. That's why I now enjoy the 'Peace that passes all understanding' (Philippians 4 verse 7). Something I could never achieve by my own actions.

Every time I visit the seaside (often at Broadstairs), I love to stand and look out at the sea. I am in awe of the magnificence of His creation and the reassurance that, somewhere in those waves, my sin has been cast, never to be seen again!


